<u>Sending Electronic Transcripts Through GACollege411:</u>
Go to <u>www.GAcollege411.org</u> and click "create an account". Complete all fields (name, birth date, social security number, account name, password, etc.) Once account is created, go to the "college planning" tab to order transcripts. Electronic transcripts are Free and are available for colleges in the State of Georgia only.

What do I do if I need a paper Transcript?

It is the responsibility of each student to mail his/her transcripts. Students requesting transcripts must complete a form in the Counseling Office stating the number of transcripts needed. Each transcript will be "officially" sealed in an envelope that must not be opened by the student for it to remain official. The cost is \$5.00 for each. Please allow 3-5 days for completion of your request.

What and where is the College and Career Room?

The College and Career Room is YOUR room in the Counseling Office. It is there for you to research colleges, vocational and technical schools, careers and scholarships. Through research materials, catalogs, videos, software programs, and internet access, you will be able to explore all your options. You can even pick up SAT and ACT registration packets there. Early decision (ED) plans are binding – a student who is accepted as an ED applicant must attend the college. Early action (EA) plans are nonbinding – students receive an early response to their application but do not have to commit to the college until the normal reply date of May 1.

*Pass Procedure:

- 1. As soon as the College Representative visit is announced, you may come to the Counseling Office (before or after school, and during lunch) to get a pass. Be sure to plan ahead because passes will not be issued the day of the visit.
- 2. The teacher must sign the pass before you attend the session, which will be held in the Counseling Office. The teacher has final decision as to whether the student may attend.
- 3. Upon arrival give Mrs. Varzaly your pass and it will be signed before you return to class. If you miss the entire class period, you must present the pass to the teacher the following day.

When you register for the SAT, you must provide:

- Your full legal name as it appears on your photo ID, date of birth, sex, and your mailing address. The test date, test center and test type you are choosing. Your high school and your current grade level. Completed and signed statement and signature or acceptance of online terms and conditions.
- Students will be prompted to provide a photo during registration for the SAT and SAT Subject Tests. Plan to upload a picture of yourself during online registration.
- Students must present their Admission Ticket to enter the test center. No one will be admitted without a ticket and acceptable photo ID!
- Standby testing will not be permitted. Online requests for waitlist status may be possible until approximately five days before the test.
- Changes to test center, test date or test type must be made at least two weeks prior to test day. Changes on the day of the test will
 not be permitted.
- Registration and admission ticket photo guidelines: Similar to a passport or wallet photo in size, clear, properly focused and correctly exposed, free of shadows or glare. Photo must show the student's full face directly facing the camera, from the shoulders up. The student's current appearance and the photo must match. An uncovered head, unless the student normally wears head covering for a religious purpose. Photo must show only the student no other people.

- 2015 First-Year Application opens Sept. 3 visit http://admissions.uga.edu
- Deadline: Oct. 15 (please do not wait until the deadline, submit all materials well before Oct. 15)!
- Student must complete Part 1 of the application and submit electronically with the \$60 application fee.
- Send official high school transcript through gacollege411.org.
- Send official SAT or ACT scores with writing directly from the testing agency. (Oct. test scores will be accepted)!
- Counselor/School Evaluation form and "student & parent brag sheets" must be brought to Mrs. Varzaly no later than Sept. 30.
- Frequently check your "Student Status" on the UGA website to see what has been received and what is missing!
